Vision & Hearing Screening - Nov 14th

Fairfax Lions screened the vision and hearing of 126 students (K, 3rd, 7th graders) at St Timothy School (Chantilly, VA) on November 14, 2024. We referred 6 students for follow-up care (3 for hearing, 3 for vision). This quick and effective screening process identifies youngsters who may have limited vision/hearing capability, and provides a very welcome service to schools without that capability. Children are screened only if the parent signs a permission slip, and the School nurse informs parents of any referral. November 21-23 Fruit Sale

We had 245 customers pre-order 564 items for the November sale, and more purchase items at the sales site. We encourage customers to pre-order, and the processes work most of the time. An example of behind-the-scenes work: customers make mistakes, like a double order, and ask for help. Lion Joe Rovansek handles those, and for a double order, cancels both orders...the reply of one customer:

"Joe, Thanks for the quick reply and help! Received email for both cancellations. (I suppose I could have found folks to take it or try selling it out of my truck on a street corner LOL!) I successfully placed the order again and received the 10% discount. Probably operator error on my end the first time. By the way, I have two corneas thanks to the lowa Lions."

That's just one example of the many customer issues resolved to keep customers happy.

Pre-orders ended Nov 13, and Lion Marty Lockard placed our final fruit order (329 cases) including extras for donations (Thanksgiving food baskets, etc) and drive up sales. The hard work began Wednesday - when the FL fruit was delivered, and Thursday-Saturday when customers picked up orders. We learned the FL grower shipped less than we ordered, so we had to cancel or defer some prepaid sales. (The grower in Dec will make-up for problems caused by shortages.) We appreciate volunteer work by 4 Woodson HS robotic Club students (including Lion-son Nicholas Rumberg), members of the Harley Owners Group (Larry Larson, Johnny Boaz, and Russ ____), Jordan Hendrickson, Allen Smith, Tanya Greeley Willoughby - and of course our Club members! 

and Lion Mike Greeley was the first to guess correctly. That dapper gentleman checking out a new car in 1960, in Toronto, is Lion Joe Breda. Born in Conegliano, Italy (not far from Venice), Joe was young when World War II began. He was nine years old when he began working against the occupying Nazi's and Mussolini's army, by carrying messages and ammunition to and from partisans. He would walk through fields and farms to deliver messages; the enemy soldiers ignored the mere children, thought to be playing. Joe believes he helped save a dozen American pilots who had been shot down over Italy, by helping the US flight crewmen avoid capture. After the war, and high school, Joe left

home at age 19, for education and adventure. He spent a year in England, then moved to Canada where an Italian family sponsored him. He received his BS degree from the Northern Institute of Technology at the University of Toronto, and he joined the Canadian Army Reserve as an electrical communications officer. Joe and Terry met in 1961 at a Saturday night dance. Terry was a senior in high school at the time, and Joe paid his way through college as a dance instructor with Arthur Murray Dance Studio. They were married in 1963.

Joe worked for General Electric in Radar communication, then Joe and Terry moved to CA for better opportunities. Joe became a US citizen in 1970, and moved to VA - again for better engineering opportunities. Joe added to his education with a Bachelors Degree from George Mason, and an MBA from National Louis University (associated with American University). In VA, Joe established himself in a technical engineering career where he was most successful - as the key technical engineering

contractor resolving electronic interference problems for US Navy weapons systems, finally retiring in 2013. Along the way, Joe joined FHLC in 1974 and has ever since been a very active and involved member, serving as Club President, 1982-83.

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

Fake Shredding Events?

This was in an Nov 12th email from Chairman, FX County Board of Supervisors:

Beware of Misinformation About Shredding Events

What happened? Residents have recently reported arriving at Fairfax County facilities for shredding events that were falsely advertised on a suspicious website. These events are not associated with the County, and we urge you to take steps to avoid misinformation and potential scams.



Here are some tips to avoid shredding scams:

- On-Site and Off-site Shredding: Verify if shredding will happen on-site and in front of you or at another location. Reputable companies will take the documents in locked boxes then provide a certificate of destruction or allow you to watch your documents being shredded. Stay vigilant and check the county's <u>website</u>, <u>social media channels</u> or confirm with county facilities to make sure an event is legitimate before attending.
- Verify Community Events: Occasionally, a community group may hold an event at a county facility, so contact the group to confirm.
- Verify the Shredding Company: If it's a private company, make sure the company is reputable by checking with the Better Business Bureau.

Be alert, it is not hard to visualize how a fake shredding event could put your private information into the hands of bad persons.

SIM Card Swapping: Risks, Protection, Tips From Identity Force

When it comes to mobile device security, taking the proper safety precautions while online or using social media is typically the first line of defense. This has become more important than ever, as recent rises in SIM card swapping attacks are causing concern. Here, we will discuss the risks associated with SIM card scams, signs you've fallen victim and essential security tips to safeguard your mobile identity.

What is SIM card swapping?

For your smartphone to function properly, it requires a chipped card referred to as a <u>subscriber</u> <u>identity module</u>, or SIM card for short. The SIM card contains the necessary data that allows you to make

calls and send texts to your contacts. It ties your phone number to your personal device.

SIM card swapping, also referred to as SIM jacking, occurs when a scammer seizes ownership of a phone number by tricking a provider into switching a SIM card to a device that they control. This can be done through a variety of techniques, but most commonly attackers rely on social engineering tactics to successfully take ownership of your phone number without your authorization.

If scammers are able to gather enough personally identifiable information (PII) about you, whether through phishing scams, social media research or through the dark web, it could be relatively simple for them to contact your carrier, bypass security questions and successfully make the SIM card switch without you or the company's knowledge.

If a hacker is able to port your phone number to their device, they then can gain access to your communications. They can read messages between you and your contacts, receive multi-factor authentication (MFA) codes to access your accounts or steal confidential information that is sent to you by your bank, employer, an online retailer or other organizations you do business with. That access is Dec 2024 Page 28 what makes SIM card swapping a serious threat to digital safety and security.

Stealing an individual's SIM card for malicious use may sound like an extensive, complicated attack that seems unlikely. Yet figures from the Federal Bureau of Investigation show that **reports of SIM swapping increased 26% from 2021 to 2022, and the agency reports more than \$80 billion has been lost to SIM card hacking since 2018**.

Signs your SIM card has been hacked

In some cases, it might not be immediately obvious someone has swapped your SIM card and stolen your information, but there are a few signs to look for:

- You're notified by your phone provider. Pay attention to communications from your phone provider, as they should notify you if a SIM card has been activated on a new device.

- You're unable to make calls or send text messages. If your phone has stopped functioning properly or you are no longer able to access cellular data, this is the most obvious sign someone has potentially deactivated your card and is using your phone number.

- Suspicious activity. If you notice transactions or purchases you don't remember making, it is possible a fraudster has gained access to your credit card. Check your search history, email activity and social media accounts for anything unfamiliar, as hackers who have gained access to your logins may be seeking further information about you to steal other financial information.

How to protect against SIM card swapping attacks

Proactive measures are key to protecting yourself and your privacy against these evolving kinds of cyber attacks. Stay ahead of the risks, regularly reassess and update your personal online security practices to adapt to evolving threats.

Use strong duo authentication methods - Though text and email MFA methods are still a strong security standard to practice, consider using other biometric methods like fingerprinting or facial recognition whenever available, as they provide an added barrier that is more difficult to hack.

Set up a passcode with your mobile carrier -Explore whether your carrier offers any additional security features and utilize them if available. To avoid unauthorized SIM card changes, set up a password or PIN within your account. Keep your contact information with your carrier up to date to ensure you receive prompt notifications should any suspicious activity occur.

Monitor activity on all accounts - Keep a close eye for any unusual activities within your online accounts. Be cautious about sharing personal information, especially on social media.

Stay educated - Familiarize yourself with common social engineering tactics that are used to manipulate individuals into revealing sensitive information, like phishing, vishing or impostor scams. If you know what to look for, the easier it will be to spot an illegitimate communication.

Attackers are constantly updating their tactics, often trying to pit our own technology against us. Make sure you know the risks you may face and stay vigilant for the signs that your data may be compromised.


