wooden steps leading to the fruit sale van. He installed new wheels & burners to replace broken ones on a grill we use for food sales. He donated plastic storage bins and shelving, and reorganized our storage shed. He created a system for hanging fruit sale signs, when the sales van's doors were too small to hold the signs. And, discovering a broken door latch on the sale van, he created a work-around locking system. For these special contributions, Lion Joe Rovansek is recognized as our "Handyman of the Year."

Board Meeting - Feb 25th

At the monthly board meeting, two guests were present: Lions Marty Lockard, and Tom Hewlitt. (Any club member may attend any Board meeting, to hear about Club business.)

The Club Membership Chair has contacted two potential candidate members; neither has responded.

Our club eyeglass recycling program has collected (in the eight months of this Lions year) over 11000 pair of donated eyeglasses, and 40 hearing aids. These are all delivered to the recycling center, and processed for distribution with world-wide medical mission teams.

Lions Joe Breda and Harry Parker offered to meet with the Chantilly CC to determine best dates for our club's Holiday Party 2025, and 75th Charter Night in 2026.

One VLEIF Scholarship winner was unable to attend the VLEIF Awards Luncheon on Feb 22, and will attend FHLC March 4 dinner meeting to be recognized.

Considerable discussion occurred on renewing Club 501(c)3 certification, and business licenses.

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ISCC Meeting - February 5

The Fairfax InterService Club Council guest speaker was Wendy Baird of The Lamb Center - the Fairfax-based daytime drop-in homeless shelter. Wendy said total case load is 1932 individuals, about 130 per day; most are from within FX County. The load has increased about 23% since covid. The Center received a grant from FX City to help pay for an in-house dental clinic. The biggest need to stem homelessness is affordable housing. In the future the center wants to expand mental health care service, and workforce development. Their annual budget is \$2.3M, with 2/3rds from private donations.

Local service club "Friends of the Library" reported used book sales netted more than \$20k for service programs. They reported Food For Others, a food bank, accepts donated books to give out with family meals.

The ISCC agreed to allocate time in upcoming meetings to sharing individual service clubs best practices. On March 5th, FHLC will share its processes for "communications outreach," such as web page, newsletter, and media advertising.

Remember Hearing About Lion Bob Stahl?

This newsletter is named for Lion Bob Stahl. We have written about Bob in the past...(example see the article beginning on page 18, of June 2021 newsletter: https://www.fairfaxlions.org/wp-content/uploads/2021/05/June-2021-Newsletter-3.pdf). That newsletter also reports (page 3) on FHLC achieving the "Kindness Matters Service Award" recognition.

Back to Bob Stahl...FHLC received this email: "In 1956, US Naval Commander Stahl and my father, Commander Rowland Wilson (stationed in Gibraltar) worked together to have a US Navy ship transport a Barbary Ape (named Rocky) from Gibraltar to the Zoo in Columbus, Ohio where both my father and Commander Stahl grew up. Please see news clips and Commander Stahl's letter, and photo with my father and Commander Stahl. I am doing research on Rocky. I know Commander Stahl has passed away but wondered if you could connect me to any family members who might be in possession of info on Rocky or know where I might be able to obtain any info. Thank you so very much for any help. Charlie Wilson"

An unusual passenger was taken aboard U.S.S. "Alcor" whon she paid a brief visit to Gibraltar vesterday morning. This was rRocky, a six-and-a-half-year-old Rock Ape, who lately has neen the contender for leadership of the Queen's Gate Pack.

'Rocky' has been presented by H.E. the Governor to the Mayor of Columbus (Ohio) for the school-children of that city. The Captain of the U.S.S. "Alcor," (Cmdr. R. B. Stahl) is also from Columbus, and the seaman who will be looking after Rocky's interests during the voyage is Petty Officer J. M. Reddington, from Cincinnati (Ohio).

Rocky's private quarters on hoard have been named the "Si-mian Suite" and Omdr. Stabl vil be keeping a journal on Rocky til his arrival in the U.S.A., which is expected to be shortly before

In June of last year, four pairs of Rock Apes were sent abroad—to Chester Zoo, Milwaukee Zoo, Oklahoma Zoo and the Calgary Zoo, Alberta (Canada).

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'ROCKY' ARRIVES FOR BERTH AT ZOO

The ape was presented to the zoo through the courtesy of the Navy, which trans-

ported him to this country. A former Columbus man, Comdr. R. S. Wilson, was instrumental in delivery of the ape. "Rocky," born on Gibraltar June 21, 1950, had been a leader of the pack of apes that roams the Gibraltar area. "Rocky" is not an ape at all, but a tailless monkey.—(Dispatch Staff Photo)

Dear Dr. Hanna,

Last night we watched you on NIGHTLINE with Charlie Rose and we enjoyed the show very much. As a result, I decided to write you and find out what ever happened to Rocky, the Barbary ape that arrived at your zoo in December 1956.

At that time I was commanding officer of USS ALCOR (AK259) and a CDR Wilson was the Naval Lisson Officer Gibraltar. We both had graduated from South High School in Columbus and his dad was a big shot with the Columbus Dispatch. I corried the Dispatch out of Substation #44 at the corner of Livingston & Champion and knew Wilson slightly since he was older than I. When ALCOR arrived in Gibraltar in early December he came on board and recognized me and we had a short reunion. Later when we were in Naples a series of messages began re ATCOR taking a Barbary are back to Morfolk, Va. for shipment to the zoo at Columbus. Rocky came on board in a large cage with a basket of small benamas and a basket of peanuts in small plastic bogs with crossed British and American flags on each bag. A wealthy American had established a fund to provide peanuts for the apcs. Rocky was #2 in the Queen's Pack and he had just finished a bly fight with the CO of the Pack and had lost. He had some real bites on his arms which he licked all across the Atlantic.

So we began our homeward journey thinking we had a good Navy public relations pre-holiday chuckle. We were to call it OPERATION ANTHROPOID; Mission-"Get the age home by Christmas." The Navy went along at first and thea decided they would not touch it because of the service men who could not get home for Christmas. We arrived in Norfolk and learned that the CO. Naval Air Facility. Columbus, Ohio had a plane waiting to take the age to Columbus so that he could present the ape to Columbus. We had the last laugh because that day the first gorills born in captivity suddenly appeared in the Columbus Zoo and that was news.

I have never been to your zoo but the next time I am in Columbus I will look you up and maybe you can show me the cage Rocky occupied for so many years.

Financial Crimes Awareness

In a sophisticated scam, fraudsters are using social media and other channels to lure investors into "pump-and-dump" schemes. Their goal is to create a buying frenzy using false and misleading information that artificially inflates, or "pumps" up, the price of a stock. Once the price has surged, the fraudsters quickly "dump" their shares by selling them at the inflated value.

In these schemes, the stock eventually crashes, leaving unsuspecting investors who purchased at the higher price holding devalued shares—often leading to significant financial losses. We want to make sure you can recognize the signs so that you can protect yourself and your assets.

How this pump-and-dump scheme works

Fraudsters create fake social media profiles of celebrities, Schwab professionals, and other financial experts to gain credibility. They may also use social messaging apps like WhatsApp, X (formerly Twitter), and Telegram, as well as lower-tech methods like text messages and phone calls. The fraudsters then lure potential investors into private investment groups where they are pressured March 2025

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into investing in specific securities at set times to inflate the price of these securities.

Know the tactics & warning signs.

- **Get-rich-quick offers.** We'll never ask you to invest in specific stocks over social media or invite you to exclusive investor groups. If you receive unexpected messages urging you to invest in specific stocks through exclusive private groups, these are scams.
- Stock purchase manipulation. Fraudsters may try to guide you step by step, asking you to buy specific stocks and invest specific amounts. Never follow investment directions from someone you don't personally know.
- Manipulative tactics and coaching. To avoid detection, fraudsters may manipulate you into initiating trades or transactions yourself. They may even provide scripts with instructions on what to say if questioned. If anyone tries to coach you into saying or doing specific things, it's a red flag.

Sure looks like a scam - a prudent caution NEVER click on a link unless you are certain it is legit!
